Getting around

Glasgow has an extensive subway and bus network. A Roundabout ticket provides unlimited one-day travel on ScotRail and the Subway to more than 110 stations.



By subway

Subway trains run up to every four minutes at peak times, serving a circuit of 15 stations.



By bus

First Bus Greater Glasgow services extend throughout the city, providing a quick and convenient means of travel.




By bike

Glasgow is easy to explore by bike using its 185 miles (300km) of cycleways. Pick up a rental bike from OVO and others.

Getting to Glasgow

Located in western Scotland, in the Lowlands

- Glasgow Airport is Scotland's second busiest international hub, and is just a 15-minute bus ride from the city centre.
- There are direct flights to Glasgow from several English airports, including London Heathrow, Gatwick, Manchester and Birmingham. The flight duration ranges from about 1 to 1.5 hours.
- If travelling from London, Avanti West Coast runs the quickest service, taking around four hours and 30 minutes. Edinburgh is just 50 minutes away, while the city also has connections to Birmingham and Manchester, among other hubs.
