St George's Quarter

Close to Liverpool Lime Street Station and at the heart of some of Liverpool's top attractions.

Cavern Quarter

Getting around

From extensive train services to eco-friendly buses and ferries across the River Mersey, Liverpool offers multiple ways to get around. Much of the city centre is also pedestrianised, making it easy to explore on foot.



By train

Merseyrail offer train tickets, including day and family tickets.



By boat

Mersey Ferries offer opportunities to see the city's landmarks from the water. The 'Do the Doubles' sightseeing package combines a ferry trip with a 'City Explorer Open Top Bus Tour'.



By bus

Hop on one of the city's electric buses for an eco-friendly way to explore. Saveaway one-day tickets give access to bus, rail and ferry travel, and save money, too.

Getting to Liverpool

Located in north-west England

- Liverpool John Lennon Airport is served by major international and domestic airlines.
- There are direct flights to Liverpool from major English airports including London Heathrow and Gatwick, Manchester and Birmingham. The average flight duration is 1 hour.
- Liverpool is a 2hr 15min train journey from London. Fast and regular train connections from other cities including Manchester and Birmingham.
- Companies such as National Express and Megabus operate regular routes between Liverpool and major destinations like London, Manchester, Birmingham and Leeds.
