Places to stay in Brighton



Kemptown

Kemp Town is a vibrant, historic neighbourhood known for its grand Regency architecture, independent shops, lively LGBTQ+ scene, and proximity to the beach.

Hanover

Hanover in Brighton is a quirky, hillside neighbourhood famed for its colourful terraced houses and an abundance of cosy pubs and restaurants, offering a laid-back, local vibe just a short walk from the city centre.

Hove

Once a separate part of Brighton, now in a happy marriage, Hove is known for its elegant Regency architecture and leafy streets. It offers a more relaxed and residential atmosphere while still being close to the vibrant city life.

Getting around

Brighton's compact size makes it easy to explore by foot, bike or bus once there. Brighton and Hove's buses are regular, cost-effective and eco-friendly – making them the ideal way to journey further afield.



By train

Check train times to Brighton from destinations across the southeast, including Gatwick and find out more about times, fares and discounts.



By foot

Brighton is best explored on foot. Visitors can download one of VisitBrighton's maps, and hit the streets.



By bike

Hire a bike and head out on Brighton's coastal route, for sea views and access to the South Downs Way and National Park.

Getting to Brighton

Located in south-east England

- London Gatwick is the closest international airport to Brighton, taking around 30 minutes by train with various rail companies; see National Rail to play a journey.
- With regular trains from London, Portsmouth and Southampton, as well as the Eurostar from King's Cross St Pancras, it's quick and easy to get to Brighton from destinations across the southeast.
- National Express offer a coach from London to Brighton taking around two hours.
